In regatta season, we often become all too familiar with close calls in races. The shorter distances mean that crews win by the shortest of margins, compared to the lengths of a head race. We hear the commentators mention the victor surging in the final meters, edging forwards by a fraction of a length, a canvas, or bowball. This summer season was no different for our senior men, finding themselves on either side of the klaxon call across the various events attended. Margins were tighter than ever with the bulk of the year spent land training, lacking the much-needed technical refinement on the water. Despite our lack of knowledge of where Lancaster was in the national university crowd, the return to racing was welcomed with open arms. Finally, as we emerged from lockdown, churning out countless lengths of the Lune, we could race something that wasn't Charlie in the launch, a pace boat on the erg screen, or another Lancaster **8**

The start to the racing season didn't require us to travel far. On our home stretch, Lancaster Head saw the Hudson dominate the Lune, taking first place overall despite the handicap system in place, biasing results in smaller boats. Next, Durham was a marked by a series of exciting heats and ever so marginal losses in the finals. To top the mixed results up until that point, our season finale marked the return to the notoriously windy Holme Pierrepont water sports centre for BUCS. During the weekend, the senior men's crews performed extremely well across the board, all crews fighting their way into a final after the time trial. Our largest success from this event resulted from a nail-biting finish in the C final with the Hudson crew's surge "Thunderball" pushing past York in the last 100m. A sweet turning of the tides after a bitter loss during the land-based erg Roses competition.

Now in Michaelmas term, one that is defined by rising water levels, we say goodbye to old crewmates, and say hello to new ones. Despite this changing of the seasons, our Senior Men return as strong as ever. We approach this next year with heads held high, eagerly awaiting our time in warmer weather, racing shorter distances, and finishing on the right side of the klaxon call.

A lot of the women kept up with their water training over summer, either making the most of the summer rowing setup here at Lancaster, or at their local boat clubs. We kicked off this academic year with a two week Training camp, and despite the sessions lost due to the weather, had a very promising start. The women who have moved up from novices this year have fitted in very well and I'm sure will make great additions to the squad! A week after the freshers fair and we have recruited six women into the senior squad who have rowed before. From the training they have been to already they appear to be fitting in seamlessly and are helping to boost the squad to around 30 women now. Our focus is now on trying to create a cohesive style of rowing within the squad and getting us head race ready. The first race this term will be Dee head where we are sending an 8 to help provide those who sadly didn't get the chance to do head races last year some experience of what they are like. Our main race focus of the term is Rutherford head where will hopefully get some competitive crews out and really show what the women are capable of.


Novice Men's Captain Euan Miller

Lancaster Novice Men attended 2 races this year - Durham Regatta and BUCS Regatta. Durham was unfortunately a very short lived race; having mobilised a nov men's eight to go to Durham after only a few weeks of training (waking up at 3 am for the occasion!), a missed stroke off the start led to a crash that disgualified the boat. As a result of this mishap, the Nov men looked eagerly towards BUCS as their only real chance to show themselves this season, and trained all the harder for it. The Mens Beginner 1 4+ narrowly missed out on the AB semi finals - missing it by 1.2 seconds in the time trial. Off the start of the C final, it seemed that Westminster was up on Lancaster by a couple of lengths, with no other real competition from the rest of the field. The guys managed to edge it back, drawing level at the 1000m mark. A storming performance then saw them gain 10 seconds over the Westminster Crew over 500m, pushing out their lead into the finish beating the field by 16 seconds. The Men's Beginner 18+ had a successful time trial - placing 12th and making the AB semi finals. A broken handle in their semi-final saw them with no chance to make the A final, but they came back strong for the B-final. As the Beginner 1 and 2 competitions were combined for racing, most of the Beginner 1 field were also in the B final and below, and medals for the beginner 1 category were still up for grabs. A strong Caius College crew stormed out in front, leaving a tight field competing for Bronze - the boys included. A tough final 500m meant they came under 5 seconds from claiming the bronze medal, coming 4th in the final and 5th in the category, with a very strong performance. I can't properly express how proud I am of them so far - their resilience throughout the term has shone through, especially in regard to difficulties with self isolation, covid scares and exams. Their jovial and upbeat attitude has made them a pleasure to coach this term. The freshers fair saw lots of interest - from freshers to postgrads. As a result, we are starting the year with upwards of 35 nov men, so we are aiming to produce two strong, dedicated eights throughout the year. I think this is realistically achievable and an exciting prospect.
